

Dr. Áine Roddy is a health economist specialised in the economics of autism and mixed methods research. She was a recipient of the Irish Research Council and Hardiman Research scholarships and recently completed her doctorate on the economics of autism at National University of Ireland, Galway. She holds a double first class honours degree in economic and social studies and a first class honours master degree in health economics. She was the lead researcher of a mixed methods large national study on the economic costs and unmet needs of children and adolescents with autism in Ireland. Her research has been published in high impact journals, with research findings attracting extensive media coverage. She is currently the project lead for the Irish phase of an international autism study on improving interactions between autistic people and the criminal justice system being led by the Policy and Analytics Centre, A.J. Drexel Institute, Philadelphia. She is also the lead economist advising on the International Society for Autism Research (INSAR) international policy brief “*Autism and the Criminal Justice System: Policy Opportunities and Challenges*”. This project involves working in collaboration with self-advocates and multidisciplinary experts from Philadelphia and numerous countries.
